ART HUB KORT FORTALT

Art Hub er, som navnet antyder, en hybrid. Et tværdisciplinært og internationalt samlingssted, hvor kunstnere, kuratorer, andre typer fagligheder, institutioner, organisationer og publikummer møder hinanden på kryds og tværs. Men allerbedst kan man beskrive Art Hub som et udviklingssted for den yngre billedkunstscene.

Store dele af den danske kunstscenes udøvere, særligt de yngre, lever i dag under skræbelige vilkår. De er, viser undersøgelser, udfordret på økonomi, atelierpladser og netværk, men billedkunsten som fag er også udfordret på et større strukturelt plan; på dens rolle og mulighedsrum i samfundet. Det er Art Hubs ambition at styrke billedkunstscenen på netop disse grundlæggende punkter og:

1. give unge billedkunstnere bedre muligheder for at udvikle sig, møde nye fagligheder, styrke internationalt netværk og derigennem etablere nye, bæredygtige veje for deres kunstneriske praksis.
2. udbrede kendskabet til, hvad en billedkunstnerisk praksis er og kan være.
3. samlet være med til at styrke billedkunstens betydning i vores samfund.

Helt konkret arbejder Art Hub med disse initiativer ved at:

1. invitere og aflønne kunstnere i residency af et halvt års varighed.
2. virke som kunstnerisk udviklingsrum, sparringspartner og netværksfacilitator for en række unge billedkunstnere og kuratorer.
3. starte offentlige og tværdisciplinære samtaler og partnerskaber, både fysiske og online, nationale som internationale, med samtidskunsten som omdrejningspunkt.

Lige nu holder Art Hub til på Halmtorvet i Københavns Kødby, hvor kunstnerne Rasmus Myrup (DK), Lito Kattou (CY) og Masar Sohail (IQ/DK) er i residency i efteråret. Dem kan du læse mere om her. Inden for en overskuelig fremtid flytter Art Hub til større lokaler og bliver arbejdssted for endnu flere kunstnere.

Blandt mange andre ting har vi dette efterår også iværksat et større program, Connectedness, der med en bred vifte af offentlige arrangementer dykker ned i den viden og research, som produceres, når kunstnere skaber værker.

I Art Hub betragter vi nemlig ikke kun kunst som færdige værker, men som en vidt forgrenet vidensskabende disciplin, der har potentiale til at udfylde langt flere roller i vores samfund, end tilfældet er nu. Alt det vil vi fortælle meget mere om i kommende nyhedsbreve. Tak fordi du læste med!

ART HUB IN A NUTSHELL

As its name implies, Art Hub is a hybrid – an interdisciplinary and international space where artists, curators, and other professionals, institutions, organizations, and audiences can meet in different forums and formats. But most of all, Art Hub is a development site for the younger generation in the contemporary art scene.

The majority of people on the Danish art scene lead a precarious existence. Surveys show that they face challenges in terms of income, studio space, and networks. But the visual arts are also challenged at a more structural level in terms of their role and opportunities in society. It is Art Hub's ambition to strengthen the visual arts in precisely these key areas, as well as to:

1. give emerging visual artists more scope to develop, meet other professionals in an interdisciplinary context, strengthen their international network, and by doing so, establish a more sustainable basis for their art practice.
2. increase knowledge and awareness of what art practice today is and can be.
3. meet the overriding goal of promoting visual art's relevance to society.

At a concrete level, Art Hub works to meet these goals by:

1. inviting and paying artists in residency for a period of six months.
2. providing a space for artistic development and acting as a sparring partner and network facilitator for emerging visual artists and curators.
3. initiating public and interdisciplinary conversations and partnerships focusing on the visual arts – both physically and online.

Right now, Art Hub is located at Halmtorvet in Copenhagen's old meatpacking district, and this fall, Art Hub's artists in residency are Rasmus Myrup (DK), Lito Kattou (CY), and Masar Sohail (IQ/DK), who you can read more about here. In the foreseeable future, Art Hub will move into larger premises and offer workspace to far more artists.


Among other things this fall, we have also launched the program Connectedness with public events that delve into the knowledge and research generated by artists when creating their works.

At Art Hub, we don't limit our view of visual art to finished works, but see it instead as a wide-ranging, knowledge-generating discipline with the potential to play a far greater and more diverse role in society than it does today. 
